Nature Notes

- Asters are beginning to bloom in earnest with the passing of the autumnal equinox, and it's fun to count the various white, pinks and purple species whose name in Latin means "star," an appropriate description of the compound flowers that form floral constellations in area prairies until first frost. Perennial sunflowers, eupatorium, Pitcher's sage, euphorbia and gentians continue, with many goldenrods having peaked. Recent rains should make this fall a gorgeous one.
- We've already lost over an hour of sunlight in the past 4 weeks; fall and winter skies promise gorgeous sunrises and sunsets, and fall contstellations will be in good view this week with the moon waxing toward new, meaning dark skies. This would be a good week to look at the Milky Way with binoculars if you've never done that before--or even if you have!
- Look for migratory waterfowl including a variety of seagulls and pelicans, along with the usual suspects including herons, shorebirds, teal, coots, and turkey vultures. Blackbird flocks continue to get bigger and you can still watch chimney swifts go down the courthouse chimney downtown after sunset.
- If you're still looking for monarch butterflies, go to the Baker Wetlands and look around all the sunflowers still blooming.
