

## **Nature Notes**

- There are still a surprising number of trees with leaves still attached especially in town due to the heat island effect. Drive into the country and most trees have already lost their leaves.
- Migratory waterfowl are increasing in numbers; the Squaw Creek numbers are updated every Monday, so check out numbers in coming weeks to see when the Snow Geese arrive, sometimes upwards of a million birds. Whooping Cranes have

been at Quivira in central Kansas for the past week, while seagulls and ducks are still plentiful in the area, as are raptors.

- Deer hunting season (firearm) season starts November 30 and runs through Dec. 11, and this includes public land such as Clinton and Douglas County State Lakes. This might be a great time to check out Prairie Park Nature Prairie, the
- Baker/Wakarusa Wetlands, Wells Overlook Park and other good hiking areas not so prone to being hunted.
- Consider an eastern red cedar for a Christmas tree this year.

  Most local farmers would be happy to let you cut one for free,
  and while pricklier, it's more fragrant than pines.
- Packrats have been filling their nests with seeds and nuts of all kinds, including acorns, honey locust seed pods, walnuts, berries, etc. Area tribes used to raid the nests made of sticks and leaves to harvest the bounty for themselves.
