

## **Nature Notes**

Over 250,000 snow geese are currently at Loess Bluff National Wildlife Refuge (formerly known as Squaw Creek NWR) If you want something closer, check out the migratory waterfowl on Clinton, Perry, Pomona or Clinton along with the Wakarusa/Baker wetlands, specially around sunrise/sunset.

Elms, maples and cedars continue to bloom, multiflora roses and honeysuckle shrubs and vines have started leafing out, with greening cool season grasses and wheat being slowed by the dry weather. If we get some moisture this week, many plants will jump ahead even faster.

Choose a native woodland such as the Baldwin Woods, around Clinton Reservoir or Douglas County State Lake, and take weekly walks in March and April and watch the emerging wildflower leaves and blossoms. Take a camera and a friend-you won't regret it!

You can already see spider gossamer in grasses and shrubs as they are already out and about. Look in dry powdery soil for the little funnel traps made by ant lions looking for food.

Cottontail, mole, mourning dove, cardinal, redtail hawk mating season is happening; if it rains look for crawdad nests, and coyotes are still nursing their young. Continue to listen for woodcocks and western chorus frogs.
