## Nature Notes

§ The Wakarusa/Baker wetlands are joining the Prairie Park in being dominated by a profusion of yellow flowers, as the wet-loving bidens/tick sunflower and annual sunflowers come into full bloom. These in turn, provide an opportunity to see a wide number of insects who pollinate these flowers: beetles, flies, bees and their spider predators.

§ Western ragweed and giant ragweed pollen are the source of some of the haziness in the sky, which can also create "pollen rings" around the sun: colorful rainbow colored rings that can be seen a little easier when you block out the sun with by standing behind a telephone pole/tree/leaves.

§ Sunrise and sunset are good times to see migratory blackbird flocks, and with the full moon rising around these times, go to a place with a good horizon like Wells Overlook or the wetlands with a pair of binoculars to observe small songbird flocks migrating across the face of the moon as it rises/sets

§ Monarchs and many other butterflies continue to pass through the area, though the numbers seem to be reduced. Find out the latest during the upcoming Monarch Watch open house Sat. Sept. 9 on West Campus (Foley Hall) 9am-2pm. Its fun for everyone and it's free.
