Nature Notes

While the spring woodland flowers are wrapping up as the oaks and hickory trees unfurl their new leaves, the prairies are just getting started and the first wave of short prairie wildflowers will be replaced with a newer wave of wildflowers that is taller than the last, keeping up with the growing grasses. This culminates in August and September with the sunflowers, goldenrods and thistles that are as tall as the tallest grasses, thereby getting their share of solar energy. As the grasses begin to thin in the fall, there are a few short wildflowers that mimic the spring ones: the short but beautiful gentians and lady's tresses.

Keep an eye out for the late morel, which deer also love to eat. Deer are also vulnerable to being hit on the roads right now, with May being the most car-deer accidents outside the mating season, due to the parental demands of newborn fawns this time of year. Be especially careful when you're driving.

Some bluegrass is beginning to put out seedheads, the same time as last year. But strawberries were starting to ripen this week last year while they are still blooming this year. Expect things to catch up quite a bit this week with warm temperatures and maybe some rain, too—we still need it!
