## Nature Notes

- § Look out for black ice at night/in the morning: melting ice along the roadside during the day freezes overnight, turning that wet pavement into a skating rink. Road curves are often banked allowing melting roadside snow to flow downhill across the road, setting up a black ice scenario—be careful!
- § As always after a snow, a hike will show you where there are wild animals by their tracks. Now is the perfect time for learning animal tracks, which are also left in the mud by day.
- § Be sure to put on your calendar this Saturday's Eagles Day, held from 8:30 – 4pm at Billy Mills Middle School. Lots of kid activities, great speakers, environmental group information tables, walks in the wetlands and more. This Jayhawk Audubon-organized event is free and open to the public—don't miss it!
- § Speaking of calendar events, on Sunday night we will join the rest of North America for a total lunar eclipse. Local times: partial eclipse begins at 9:34pm, with totality between 10:41 and 11:44pm, with the partial eclipse ending at 12:51am. Highs will only be in the 20s on Sunday, so bundle up! And while you're at it, the nearly full moon rises at 5:05pm, which should be a wonderful thing to watch as the sun sets in the west.
- § Birds have trouble finding food with snow cover, so keep them well fed this week or buy a feeder at Eagles Day!
