§ It's still too early for spring wildflowers to be blooming as the week starts, with only their leaves pushing aside the dead tree leaves, but with warm temperatures and rain predicted by mid-late week, this may be the week when the first ones begin to bloom. Expect the peak native woodland wildflowers to be a few weeks away.

§ We're in the flush of "First of Season" bird sightings as turkey vultures have returned, many songbirds are returning after the winter's absence and resident eagles are nesting while owls hoot at night. It's a busy time for birds as they get more and more territorial and musical by the day.

§ March's mud will be refreshed after our rains, which will be ideal for spotting and identifying animal tracks. If you don't know what animal it is, take a picture and compare it to tracks on the internet.

§ Warmth and rain means keep your eyes open for edible pleurotis/oyster and puffball mushrooms. It's still a little early for the first flush of morels, which will come next month, and hopefully with all the moisture this should be a good year.

§ Time to brush up on thunderstorms: you can calculate the distance of lightning by counting the time when thunder arrives: 5 seconds for every mile.
