## **Nature Notes**

- Other trees unfurling new leaves, include buckeye, hickory, hackberry, honey locust and cherry. Many shrubs are leafing out including skunkbush, coralberry and dogwood, joining the the already leafed out invasive honeysuckle and privet.
- This week's rain has prompted a flush of apple-cedar rust spore horns, those gelatinous orange projections that emerge from galls found on cedar trees. Spores disperse, infecting and living on crab apple and apple leaves, twigs and fruit until they produce spores again to return to infect cedars, producing those walnut sized brown galls, starting the cycle over again.
- Woodland wildflowers continue this week, including May apples. Papaw flowers are rank in smell as they are pollinated by flies. If you want to harvest papaws in the fall, you can bring a paintbrush to help the flies pollinate by spreading the pollen from the male anthers to the female flowers.
- Many songbirds have returned and are laying eggs and wild turkeys have begun to sit on eggs. Some say it is not too early to put out your hummingbird feeders. Whippoorwills will soon arrive with their nighttime songs.
- In prairies, look for yellow flowered hoary puccoons, prairie violets and spring beauties among the still dormant grasses.
