- Wetlands, especially around sunrise and sunset, are good places to look for shorebirds and migrating redbird/grackle flocks; and reservoirs across the state hold many seagulls, some eagles, geese and ducks. Dry sunflower stalks and prairie grasses are good places to look for a variety of sparrows.
 - Oriental lady bugs are invading homes and collecting into ceiling/south-facing corners, looking for places to overwinter. Since they are an invasive species, feel free to vacuum and dispose of them. The native bright red and black box elder beetles are also clustering in sunny, protected areas as temperatures drift toward our first freezes of the season.
- There is still a chance to help collect seeds for prairie restoration projects with the Grassland Heritage Foundation this Saturday, Oct. 30 1-4pm at the Blackjack Prairie east of Baldwin: check the www.jayhawkaudubon.org calendar for details.
- The osage orange trees are dropping their hedge apples these days, so be careful not to park under one--they'll break a windshield! Watch for deer around dawn and dusk while you're at it--deer-auto collisions peak soon due to the increasing activitiy occurring around rutting or deer mating season..
