Ashy sunflowers continue blooming this week: it is a shorter perennial sunflower with lighter green leaves than many other sunflowers. Look closely and see the goldenrod soldier beetle eating pollen and pollinating the flower. This harmless insect also is found on goldenrods and other yellow flowers.

§ The Osage called August "Yellow Flower Moon" and September "Deer Hiding Moon," but climate change may make it more appropriate to switch these names, since deer bucks are growing their antlers in August and the extended growing season makes September yellower than August in these parts.

§ There are spectacular yellow carpets of bidens along the south side of the south Lawrence Trafficway loop. Perennial and annual sunflowers are showing off all across the state, while many prairies are also showing off blue Pitcher's sage, fall thistles, white and false boneset, and snow on the mountain.

§ Ever wonder how spiders string strands of web across wide gaps to hang their webs? They use the wind, which carries the gossamer pulled from the spider's spinarettes until it sticks to another twig/leaf/wall. Then the spider adds more strands and builds the orb from these anchor points. Now is the perfect time to spot and watch spiders in action, or to photograph a dew-laden web in the cooler mornings.

§ Grassland Heritage Foundation is having a native plant sale this Saturday in Lawrence and now is a good time to harvest ripe seeds from many native plants.

§ The blackbird flocks are growing larger, gathering on power lines and as bird rivers in the sky at sunrise and sunset.

§ Drought now covers 90.4% of Kansas, with the worst in the SW and NW parts of the state.
