Wildflowers blooming this week include echinacea, cinquefoil, sensitivebrier, delphinium, penstemons, spiderwort, oxeye daisy, daisy fleabane, evening primrose, prairie rose, prairie phlox, white and blue wild indigo, deptford pink, many milkweed species, euphorbia, blackeyed susan, and many, many others, with fritillaries and other butterflies, bumblebees and other pollinators busy drinking nectar and pollinating on the side. The next few weeks are the best time of year to check out a native praire for the wildflowers, birds and insects.

Wetlands are full of life with snapping turtles, frogs, herons, ibis, redwinged blackbirds, meadowlarks and dozens of other songbirds to listen to. Slightly lowering water levels have given many species of shorebirds a better habitat as well.

Water striders, spittle bugs and lightning bugs abound. June bugs beat against the screen door and moths beat against windows after dark, with tree frogs hanging onto the glass, waiting for a bug to come close enough to eat.

The pink blooming groundcover found along some roadsides is crown vetch. It is easy to propagate but can be quite aggressive and is considered to be a noxious weed. Other noxious weeds worth plucking right now include musk thistle, honeysuckle and sericea lespedeza.

Brome fields may start being baled for hay if weather is dry; watch how quickly the row crops are growing.
