§ Many moths are still in their cocoons, which you can find attached to sticks. Beetles, millipedes and other insects can be found under logs in the leaf litter. Dragonfly, mayfly and caddis fly nymphs can be found under flat rocks in shallow creeks. I have a friend who found a jumping spider in the middle of a stalk of grass in January! It is surprising how early you can see strands of spider gossamer on brush and grasses, signs that spiders have been recently out and about.

§ Rabbits don't hibernate or store food caches like many other mammals. They find nourishment this time of year by eating twigs, buds and bark from trees and shrubs or eating their own droppings, covering a wider area than in the spring and summer in their search for nourishment.

§ There are large flocks of waterfowl and songbirds, various rodents, fish and other animals, and there are lots of owls, hawks, falcons and eagles hunting them. This is the perfect time to learn how to identify the different birds of prey!

§ So what is green this time of year? Moss, bristly greenbriar vines; daisy, mullein, dandelion and thistle rosettes; yarrow and poison hemlock leaves, onion and wild garlic tops and some cool season grasses and sedges. And of course eastern red cedars, Kansas' only native evergreen. This time of year, berries start to drop, along with some of the leaves.
